INTRO:

- 1. "We are just the sport of the grim and inscrutable president of the universe; we are the playthings of fate and of chance."
- 2. There is a different view of life. Rom. 8:28

I. FITS INTO A PATTERN OF GOOD.

- A. No words of the Bible are more comforting than these..
- B. There are no words we would rather believe and none we find more difficult at times to believe.
- C. We must see life from God's view.

II. I KNOW.

- A. These were favorite words for Paul. Phil. 1:19; 2 Cor. 5:1; 2 Tim. 1:12
- B. There is a vast difference between being in the hands of fate and being in the hands of a loving heavenly Father.

III. WHAT DOES THIS VERSE SAY?

- A. It does not say this is how God deals with all men or that everything that happens is good.
- B. It is a promise for those who love God.
- C. The general providence of God is amazingly impartial. Psalm 73:3; Psalm 73:16, 17; Matt. 5:45
- C. Sickness, sorrow, loss, failure, disappointment these stresses invade the lives of good people as well as evil, but the result are different. **Matt. 7:24-27**
- E. Even painful discipline can bring good. Heb. 12:11
- F. Paul says "all" things. Gal. 6:17; 2 Cor. 11:23-29; Phil. 1:12
- G. "Together" is a very important word in this verse.
- H. Everything must be related to the end.

CONC:

- 1. Full comprehension of this promise must embrace not only this life, but also the life to come.
- 2. If we were sure that life ceased at the end of our earthly existence we would have no interest in these words.
- 3. While we live we must accept this promise by faith.
- 4. Can we accept life's happenings by faith?
- 5. Does my faith have the muscle to accept God's ability to take that distasteful occurrence and fit it into a plan for my good?
